
MEDIES

CRAVAT-CORBATA- WHITE LINEN (LENGTH 61"X WIDTH 7 1/2" INCLUDES SEAMAGE) HOW TO PUT ON? HOLD IN FRONT OF YOU, DRAPED ACROSS HANDS. BRING UP TO NECK AND WRAP AROUND CROSSING IN THE BACK, BRING BACK AROUND AND TIE IN FRONT, STRAIGHTEN TOP PART OF KNOT SO IT DRAPES OVER EVENLY. MAKE SURE IT COVERS ALL OF YOUR NECK. WEAR IT EITHER INSIDE OR OUTSIDE COAT. SHOULD HAVE 2.



BREECHES-CALZONES-BLUE WOOL, 5 BRASS BUTTONS, TIES AND/OR BUTTONS AT THE BOTTOM.





GAITERS-POLAINAS -WHITE CANVAS, HORN BUTTONS. WORN ANYTIME OUT OF GARRISON TO PROTECT YOUR LEGS AND STOCKINGS FROM THE "WILDS OF FLORIDA NORTE."

STOCKINGS-MEDIAS ROJA-RED WOOL, OR COTTON. SHOULD HAVE 2 PAIR.

GARTERS-LIGAS-BLACK LEATHER, BRASS BUCKLES, KEEPERS. TO MAKE GARTERS, MEASURE THE CIRCUMFERENCE OF YOUR LEG JUST BELOW THE KNEE AND ADD ABOUT 5 INCHES, THIS IS YOUR LENGTH, THE WIDTH SHOULD BE NO WIDER THAN THE WIDTH OF THE BUCKLES.


SHOES-ZAPATOS-BLACK GOATSKIN, SQUARE TOE, HIGH TONGUE, HIGH HEEL. BUCKLED OR TIED. HESSIAN SHOE THROUGH GODWIN IS VERY SIMILAR AS IS FRANKLIN FROM FUGAWEE OR USE ANY OTHER 18TH CENTURY SHOE.






WOODLAND MOCCASIN-FOR OFF DUTY USE. (NOT AT THE CASTILLO)


- 1. LAY OUT THE BASIC PATTERN ON A PIECE OF PAPER, WHEN YOU HAVE IT RIGHT TRANSFER IT TO CLOTH. NOTE THAT THE DISTANCE FROM "A" TO "B" IS MEASURED AROUND YOUR INSTEP. ADD ABOUT 1/8 TO 1/4 FOR THE SEAM. FIT THE CLOTH PATTERN AROUND YOUR FOOT FOR SIZE. AND SHAPE.
- 2. TRACE THE PATTERN ON LEATHER AND CUT OUT.
- 3. PUNCH OUT HOLES ON CENTER SEAM AND WELT. FOLD LEATHER SMOOTH SIDE OUT, ALONG CENTER LINE. INSERT THE WELT STRIP INTO THE NOTCH AT THE TOE AND BEGIN SEWING WITH NEEDLE AND ARTIFICIAL SINEW.
- 4. SEW ENTIRE TOE, TAKING IN OR PUCKERING AS YOU GO ALONG TO FLATTEN THE TOE.
- 5. TURN MOCCASIN RIGHT SIDE OUT AND CUT OFF SURPLUS OF WELT STRIP.
- 6. SLIP ON THE MOCCASIN AND MARK THE BACK. PUNCH THE HOLES.
- 7. SEW BACK SEAM FROM TOP DOWN WITH OVERCAST SEAM OUTSIDE DOWN TO ABOUT 1 TO 1 1/2 INCHES FROM THE BOTTOM, HOLD TOGETHER HORIZONTAL AND SEW.



COAT-CASACA- BLUE WOOL, BRASS BUTTONS, COLARLESS, RED CUFFS, WHITE LINEN LINING.




WAISTCOAT-CHUPA- BLUE OR RED SLEEVED. REGULATIONS IN 1740 CALLED FOR A RED SLEEVED WAISTCOAT, BUT CLOTH RECORDS COMING INTO ST. AUGUSTINE POINT MORE TOWARDS BLUE. FOR ARGUMENT SAKE, EITHER ONE IS FINE. IF YOU WANT TO CLASSIFY THEM, USE BLUE FOR INFANTRY AND RED FOR ARTILLERY.









SWORD BELT-CITURON DE ARMAS-DARK BROWN LEATHER, BRASS BUCKLE.



KNAPSACK-LEATHER OR CANVASS, SQUARE, 1 LEATHER STRAP TO GO ACROSS BODY, 2 LEATHER TIE DOWNS, BRASS BUCKLES. FOR USE IN THE FIELD, NOT A GARRISON ITEM.




BLANKET-WOOL-CARRY WITHIN FOLD OF KNAPSACK OR CARRY IN PLACE OF KNAPSACK WITH TUMPLINE OF LEATHER OR ROPE.


GROUNDCLOTH OR PONCHO-FRAZADAS-IT IS NOT CLEAR EXACTLY WHAT THESE WERE, BUT THEY SHOW UP ON CLOTH RECORDS COMING INTO ST. AUGUSTINE. USE AS A SHELTER, WRAP AROUND YOUR BEDROLL OR WEAR AS MATCHCOAT FOR INCLIMATE WEATHER, WRAP AROUND BEDROLL TO KEEP DRY WHILE ON THE MOVE. SIZE SHOULD BE APPROXIMATELY 60"X 2 YARDS OF OIL CLOTH. TO WEAR AS A MATCHCOAT, DRAPE AROUND YOU, MAKE SURE IT'S NOT TOUCHING THE GROUND. BEND FORWARD SLIGHTLY AND PUT SWORD BELT ON, FOLD BACK EXCESS MATERIAL AT TOP SO YOU HAVE A HOOD, BRING TOGETHER SIDES AT NECK LEVEL AND ATTACH WITH A BLANKET PIN, YOU SHOULD HAVE ROOM TO USE YOUR ARMS BETWEEN THE PIN AND YOUR SWORD BELT. THIS CAN ALSO BE DONE WITH A BLANKET OR A COMBINATION OF BLANKET AND A OILCLOTH DEPENDING ON THE WEATHER.




CANTEEN-CANTIMPLORAS-LEATHER, GOURD, BAMBOO, BARREL.



HOW TO MAKE LEATHER CANTEEN

MAKE PATTERN TO WHAT EVER SIZE YOU ARE COMFORTABLE WITH. CUT OUT 2 SIDES AND A WELT. MAKE 2 SETS OF HOLES AND SEW. GET LEATHER TOTALLY WET AND OPEN SPOUT WITH A DOWEL ROD. POUR IN SAND AND TAMP DOWN WITH DOWEL ROD UNTIL FULL AND LET DRY COMPLETELY. POUR OUT SAND. CUT OUT HOLES FOR STRAP. HEAT UP PINE PITCH AND LINE INSIDE OF CANTEEN.PAINT OUTSIDE WITH LAQUER. MAKE A STRAP THAT FITS YOU COMFORTABLY AND A STOPPER FOR THE SPOUT.



EXTRA ACCOUTERMENTS

SEWING KIT- NEEDLES, NEEDLE CASE, AWL, SCISSORS, LINEN THREAD, BEESWAX, ALWAYS KEEP A SEWING KIT WITH YOU, THEY COME IN HANDY FOR EMERGENCIES AND LOOKS GOOD IN GUARD ROOM SCENES.

GLOVES-LEATHER, WOOL FINGERLESS. THESE COME IN HANDY IN COLD WEATHER AND IN WORK DETAILS.

BULLET MAKING- LEAD, LADLE, BULLET MOLD. THOUGH WE DON'T EVER SHOOT BALL AT EVENTS, THESE ITEMS ARE A NICE ADDITION TO YOUR KIT.

LIGHTING-CANDLES (YOUR BAYONET MAKES A GREAT CANDLE STAND), OIL LAMPS SEEM TO BE USED A LOT MORE THAN CANDLES.


SMOKING- TOBACCO, TOBACCO CONTAINER, PIPE, TAMPER. CIGARS WERE ALSO AROUND. CIGARETTES ARE NOT APPROPRIATE 18TH CENTURY ITEMS.

GAMING-DICE, CARDS, DOMINOS.

PERSONAL HYGIENE-COMB OR BRUSH, TOOTH BRUSH, TOOTH POWDER, STRAIGHT RAZOR, SOAP. BATHING WAS DONE INFREQUENTLY AND ORAL HYGIENE SEEMS TO BE NON-EXISTENT. MEN OF THE DAY WERE CLEAN SHAVEN, BUT NOT NECESSARILY EVERY DAY.




FIRE MAKING KIT-FLINT, STEEL, PALM FROWN, CHAR CLOTH, CHAR CLOTH CONTAINER.




HOW TO MAKE CHAR CLOTH AND FIRE. TO MAKE CHAR CLOTH, FIND A SMALL ROUND TIN WITH A TOP THAT IS TOTALLY REMOVABLE. WITH THE TOP AND BOTTOM OF THE TIN SECURED, DRILL A HOLE IN THE SIDE. WHEN FINISHED, YOU SHOULD BE ABLE TO TURN THE TOP OF THE TIN SO THAT AIR CAN GET INSIDE OR TURN IT ENOUGH WHERE IT WILL BE AIR TIGHT. CUT UP PIECES OF 100% COTTON OR LINEN AND PLACE INSIDE THE TIN. TURN THE TOP SO THE HOLE IS OPEN AND PLACE IN A FIRE. YOU WILL SEE SMOKE COMING OUT OF THE HOLE. WHEN THE SMOKE STOPS, YOUR CHAR CLOTH SHOULD BE FINISHED. THE WAY TO TELL IF IT'S DONE, USE YOUR FLINT AND STEEL AND SEE IF A SPARK CATCHES, IF NOT, PUT IT BACK INTO THE FIRE. MAKING FIRE IN FLORIDA IS PRETTY EASY, PALM FROWNS MAKE THIS VERY SIMPLE. FIND A PALM BUSH, WHERE THE STEMS RISE FROM THE BASE OF THE PLANT YOU WILL FIND BROWN SHEETS (WHAT SHANE LIKES TO REFER AS PULPY NUT MEAT).GRAB A GOOD HANDFUL AND KEEP SOME EXTRA IN YOUR FIRE KIT. ALSO FIND SOME DEAD PALM FROWNS THAT ARE DRY AND TAN IN COLOR AND COLLECT SMALL TO BIG PIECES OF FIRE WOOD. IN YOUR HAND LAY THE PALM FROWN, THE PULPY NUT MEAT ON TOP OF THAT, AND THE A PIECE OF CHAR CLOTH ON TOP ON TOP OF THAT. STRIKE THE FLINT AGAINST THE STEEL, AS SOON AS THE CHAR CLOTH CATCHES A SPARK, START BLOWING ON IT UNTIL A FLAME APPEARS. WHEN IT DOES, PLACE IT DOWN IN THE FIRE PIT AND START BUILDING THE SMALLEST OF YOUR STICKS AROUND IT AND KEEP BLOWING UNTIL THE WOOD CATCHES ON.

MILITARY ACCOUTERMENTS


POWDER & PRIMING FLASK-ESTUCHE- TO MAKE AN ESTUCHE, DECIDE WHAT TYPE AND SIZEYOU WANT TO MAKE, USE A 2X4" OR A 2X6". TRACE OUT THE PATTERN AND CUT. DRILL OUT THE TOP FOR A TUBE OR FLASK SPOUT. CUT OUT THE INSIDE LEAVING A HALF INCH EDGE. TRACE OUT YOUR LEATHER SIDES. EPOXY THE TUBE OR SPOUT AND THE SIDES. IF YOU ARE ADDING WOOL OR METAL, ADD THIS NOW. USE BRASS NAILS TO SECURE THE LEATHER SIDES OR THE METAL EDGE. NOW ADD STAPLES OR TUBES TO THE SIDES AND ATTACH A STRAP. IF YOU USED A TUBE FOR THE SPOUT, YOU WILL NEED A STOPPER.



WHISK AND PICK-TO KEEP FRIZEN PAN AND TOUCH HOLE CLEAN,



MUSKET TOOLS-TO TIGHTEN SCREW TO KEEP FLINT IN PLACE. EXTRA FLINTS AND FLINT WRAPS.



MUSKET CLEANING-TOOLS-CLEANING JAG, BALL WORM, PUMP, OIL BOTTLE, TOW, TOMPION AND A FEATHER. HOW TO CLEAN YOUR MUSKET. WITH THE TOOLS LISTED ABOVE AND YOUR RAMROD, YOU SHOULD BE ABLE TO KEEP YOUR CLEAN AND SERVICEABLE. TO CLEAN YOUR MUSKET, DROP YOUR HAMMER ALL THE WAY DOWN FRIZZEN OPEN, JUST IN CASE THERE IS A ROUND STILL IN THE BARREL. INSERT YOUR RAMROD ALL THE WAY IN, YOU SHOULD BE ABLE TO TELL IF THERE IS ANYTHING DOWN THERE(PING TEST). PLACE THE FEATHER IN THE TOUCH HOLE. ATTACH THE PUMP TO YOUR RAMROD, INSERT INTO THE BARREL AND PUSH IN AND OUT RAPIDLY 10 TO 20 TIMES. REMOVE THE FEATHER AND LET THE WATER LEAVE THE TOUCH HOLE. REPEAT THIS PROCEDURE UNTIL THE WATER COMES OUT CLEAR. NOW ATTACH THE CLEANING JAG TO THE RAMROD, RIP OFF SOME TOW AND ROLL IT BETWEEN YOUR HANDS UNTIL YOU HAVE CORD ABOUT 8 TO 10 INCHES LONG, WRAP THIS AROUND THE JAG AND INSERT INTO THE BARREL. REPEAT THIS PROCEDURE UNTIL THE TOW STARTS COMING OUT CLEAN. APPLY A FRESH PIECE OF TOW TO THE JAG, OIL IT AND INSERT INTO THE BARREL. AFTER THIS, IT'S GOOD TO PUT A TOMPION OR SOME KIND OF STOPPER IN THE MUZZLE TO KEEP OUT DIRT AND MOISTURE. RUB DOWN ALL THE METAL PARTS WITH EITHER TOW, FINE STEEL WOOL OR FINE SAND PAPER TO REMOVE ANY RUST AND POWDER RESIDUE. TAKE OFF YOUR LOCK AND MAKE SURE THE INSIDE IS CLEAN. OIL ALL THE METAL PARTS, OLIVE OIL WORKS REAL WELL AND IS PROBABLY WHAT SOLDADOS IN 1740 USED. THE REASON FOR THE BALL WORM IS IF YOU EVER GET A BALL STUCK IN THE BARREL, YOU'LL NEED THIS TO GET IT OUT.


CARTRIDGES-HOW TO MAKE CARTRIDGES. ITEMS NEEDED: PAPER CUT TO THE PATTERN, A 100 GRAIN MEASURE, BLACK POWDER (2F FOR MUSKETS OVER .50 CALIBER.) AND A DOWEL ROD ABOUT 8 INCHES LONG, CONCAVE ON ONE END AND NO WIDER THAN 5/8TH'S DIAMETER. SET THE DOWEL ROD ON THE PAPER AS IT SHOWS IN THE PICTURE AND ROLL. TWIST THE END AND RAM IT DOWN ON SOMETHING HARD. PULL OUT DOWEL ROD AND POUR IN 100 GRAINS OF POWDER. FOLD THE TOP OF THE PAPER IN AND INSERT END TIP INTO WRAP AROUND. WHEN CARTRIDGES ARE ISSUED, TAKE OUT TAIL OF CARTRIDGE BEFORE INSERTING THEM INTO CARTRIDGE BOX, THEY WILL BE MUCH EASIER TO GET OUT WHEN NEEDED.


EATING UTENSILS - THE SPANISH USED AN ARRAY OF DIFFERENT EATING UTENSILS. THEY BROUGHT WITH THEM THEIR OWN POTTERY, GREEN GLASS, CAST IRON AND OTHER METAL COOKING UTENSILS. AT THIS TIME THERE WAS A LARGE BLACK MARKET OF BRITISH AND FRENCH GOODS, BUT IT SEEMS THAT THEY MOSTLY USED POTTERY OF THE LOCAL INDIANS AND USED ITEMS THAT THEY COULD MAKE FROM THEIR LOCAL SURROUNDINGS, SUCH AS WOOD, HORN, ANTLER, ETC..








FUSIL-1752 SPANISH FUSIL. 1ST SPANISH MUSKET TO RESEMBLE OTHER EUROPEAN MUSKETS. WHEN PURCHASING A MUSKET, DUE TO EXPENSE, ANY MUSKET WILL DO (BROWN BESS, CHARLEVILLE, ETC.).



SPANISH LIGHT FUSIL ESCOPETA-USED BY THE SPANISH IN AMERICA IN THE EARLY TO MID-18TH CENTURY. KNOWN FOR ITS CATALAN STOCK AND MIQUELET OR PATTIA LOCK, THESE LOCKS WERE SO POPULAR THEY WERE BROUGHT BACK INTO PRODUCTION NEAR THE END OF THE 18TH CENTURY.



MATCHLOCK-THIS IS THE PREFERRED WEAPON WHEN DOING 17TH AND EARLY 18TH CENTURY SPANISH (1702 SIEGE).









THE FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF FOOD ITEMS THAT COULD HAVE BEEN FOUND AROUND ST. AUGUSTINE. NOT ALL OF THESE WOULD HAVE BEEN AROUND ALL THE TIME DUE TO SEASONS THAT THEY ARE GROWN AND SOME OF THEM WOULD HAVE BEEN IMPORTED IN. THERE WERE SOME RANCHES AROUND ST. AUGUSTINE RAISING BEEF, HOGS BEING RAISED WERE A SEMI-WILD STOCK. MOST PEOPLE HAD GARDENS AND THEIR DIET WAS A BLEND OF SPANISH AND INDIAN. THEIR COOKWARE CONSISTED OF CERAMIC AND METAL VESSELS. AS FOR THE MILITARY, HARD-TACK AND JERKY WERE IN THEIR HAVERSACKS WHEN THEY WENT ON MISSIONS.

TO MAKE HARD-TACK: YOU WILL NEED 2LB'S OF STONEGROUND WHOLE WHEAT FLOUR, SALT, AND WATER. TO MAKE BEEF JERKY: FIND A LEAN PIECE OF MEAT. SLICE IT ABOUT 1/8" THICK. MARINATE OVER NIGHT. PLACE IN OVEN ON COOKIE SHEET OR HANG WITH TOOTH PICKS FROM WIRE RACK. SET THE TEMPERATURE AT THE LOWEST DEGREE, TURN OVER EVERY COUPLE OF HOURS, COOK UNTIL MEAT IS ENTIRELY DRIED. IF YOU HAVE ACCESS TO A FOOD DEHYDRATOR, USE IT.

A DEGUELLO- CALL FOR THE CAVALRY TO ATTACK OR CHARGE. THE SAME TERM IS USED "ATTACK WITHOUT QUARTER", MEANING NO PRISONERS ARE TO BE TAKEN: "ENTRAR A DEGUELLO" DERIVED FROM DEGOLLAR, TO SLIT THE THROAT.

LA LLAMADA- CALL USED TO CONCENTRATE TROOPS INTO CLOSE ORDER OR AN INDICATED FORMATION.

LA BOTSILLA OR LA GENERALA- "BOOTS AND SADDLES", CALL FOR CAVALRY TROOPERS TO SADDLE UP, TO TAKE UP



MUSICIANS-DRUM, FIFE, BUGLE. CALLS.

LA GENERALA- A CALL FOR TROOPS TO TAKE UP ARMS FOR THE MARCH, REVIEW, DRILL OR OTHER SUCH FUNCTIONS WHETHER IN CAMP, GARRISON, OR BARRACKS. GENERAL ALARM CALL, SIMILAR TO MODERN NAVY "GENERAL QUARTERS".

LA ASAMBLEA-CALL TO TAKE UP ARMS AND FORM RANKS FOR CERTAIN DESIGNATED TROOPS, GENERALLY THE "DUTY" TROOP TO ACCOMPLISH SOME SERVICE TASK, SUCH AS STRIKE TENTS, HARNESS THE LIVESTOCK, LOAD UP THE PACK MULES, ETC. MOST UNITS HAD THEIR OWN CALL.

LA VENDERA OR LA TROPA-CALL PLAYED AFTER THE ASAMBLEA, FOR THE COMPANIES TO FORM THE BATTALION REGARDLESS OF WHETHER IN THE FIELD ENCAMPMENT, IN GARRISON OR BARRACKS, OR ON DUTY POST.

- -PLAYED WHEN BREAKING FORMATION, SIGNAL TO STACK ARMS.
- -ALSO PLAYED WHILE THE DRUMMERS WITH A DETACHMENT OF GRENADIERS ACCOMPANY THE FLAGS TO THE HEAD OF THE BATTALION OR RETIRE THEM.

LA MARCHA DE FUSILEROS- THE MARCH OF THE INFANTRYMAN.

LA MARCHA DE GRANADEROS- THE MARCH OF THE GRENADIERS (SPAIN'S NATIONAL ANTHEM).

EL ALTO- CEASE FIRE AND WHILE ON THE MARCH, TO HALT THE COLUMN

<u>LA RETREATA-</u> WIILE ON THE MARCH, IMMEDIATELY RIGHT-ABOUT-FACE AND RETREAT. IN THE FIELD, TO RETIRE. IN GARRISON, SIGNALS THE GATHERING OF THE TROOPS INTO THE BARRACKS.

EL VANDO- CALL FOR TROOPS TO PAY ATTENTION TO THE PUBLICATION OF ORDERS OR OTHER MATTERS "WITH A CERTAIN SOLEMNITY".

<u>LA LLAMADA</u>- CALL USED TO CONCENTRATE TROOPS INTO CLOSE ORDER OR AN INDICATED FORMATION. -ALSO USED TO ADVISE THE CLOSING FOR THE NIGHT OF THE GATES OF THE FORTRESS OR BARRACKS.

LA MISA- CALL TO ASSEMBLY FOR HOLY MASS.

<u>LA ORACION</u>- CALL SIGNALING THE END OF THE WORKING DAY, OFTEN SOUNDED AFTER THE EVENING BELLS OF THE NEAREST CHURCH TO THE CAMP OR BARRACKS.

-IN GARRISON, IT SHOULD BE THE FIRST PLAYED IN THE PRINCIPLE MILITARY POST, AND THEN ECHOED BY OUTLYING POSITIONS.

<u>LA ORDEN- CALL USED TO BRING TOGETHER CERTAIN PERSONS WHICH IT MAY BE NECESSARY TO DISTRIBUTE OR DETAIL TO VARIOUS TASKS OR LOCATIONS.</u>

<u>LA FAGINA</u>-PLAYED WHILE THE TROOP IS GOING OUT TO FATIGUE DUTIES, SUCH AS CUTTING FIREWOOD OR FORAGING.

-PLAYED WHEN A TROOP IS HEADED BACK TO THE BARRACKS AFTER THE COMPLETION OF A TASK. (THESE TROOPS SHOULD CARRY THEIR MUSKETS WITH THE BUTTS IN THE AIR). ENGLISH TERM: CLUBBED ARMS-SPANISH: ARMAS AL HOMBRO CON LAS CULATAS ATRAS.

LA DIANA- MODERN "REVEILLE", CALL TO COMMENCE THE DUTIES OF THE DAY, PLAYED AT DAWN, FIRST SOUNDED IN THE PRINCIPLE MILITARY POST, THEN REPEATED BY SECONDARY POSITIONS. SOMETIMES PLAYED RIGHT BEFORE AN EXECUTION.

EL CALACUERDA OR EL ATAQUE- THE ASSAULT, OR CHARGE WITH BAYONETS.

-THE CHARGE BEGAN AT A NORMAL PACE. WITH DRUMMERS GRADUALLY ACCELERATING THE TEMPO. AT CLOSE RANGE TO THE ENEMY, THE DRUMMER PLAYED THIS CALL WHICH SIGNALED THE RUSH INTO SHOCK ACTION.

LA VAQUETA-A PUNISHMENT CALL, PLAYED ON THE PERFORMANCE OF THE INFAMOUS "CARRERA DE VAQUETA", THE CONDEMNED MAN WITH NO SHIRT OR COAT RAN BETWEEN TWO RANKS OF HIS FELLOW SOLDIERS WHO WHIPPED AT HIM WITH THEIR RAMRODS OF THEIR MUSKETS UNTIL HE DROPPED. (FROM THE 18TH CENTURY TERM: BAQUETA OR VAQUETA = RAMROD)

THE OTHER MEN IN THAT RANK TURN THEIR HEADS TO THE OUTSIDE, AND MODIFY THEIR PACE SO THAT THEY ARE STRAIGHT ACROSS THE FRONT. IT TAKES A MINIMUM OF 4 STEPS TO ACCOMPLISH A WHEEL WITH A RANK 2 OR 3 MEN. CORPORALS SHOULD BE ON THE ENDS TO SERVE AS "GUIDES".

THE BASIC COMMANDS: THE SOLDIER UNDER ARMS

WHEN A SOLDADO FALLS IN FOR DRILL OR OTHER MILITARY DUTIES UNDER ARMS, HE SHOULD ASSUME THE POSITION OF THE SOLDIER WITH HIS FUSIL AT EITHER:

ARMAS AL HOMBRO = SHOULDER ARMS

OR

DESCANSEN SOBRE LAS ARMAS = REST OVER YOUR WEAPON (ORDER ARMS)

THE FIRST MOVEMENTS A RECRUIT NEEDS TO MASTER ARE THOSE NECESSARY TO GO BACK AND FORTH BETWEEN THESE TWO BASIC POSITIONS. AS IN MARCHING COMMANDS, A STANDARD COUNT OF "UNO...DOS" OR ROUGHLY ONE SECOND SHOULD SEPARATE THE COMPONENT MOVEMENTS OF THESE DRILLS. TAKE YOUR TIME, SLOW AND STEADY.

ARMAS AL HOMBRO

SHOULDER ARMS

THE SHOULDER ARMS POSITION IS REACHED FROM SEVERAL OTHER POSITIONS, BUT PRIMARILY FROM THE DESCANSEN SOBRE LAS ARMAS. THE CORRECT POSITION FOR THE FUSIL ON THE SHOULDER WITH TRIGGERGUARD AGAINST THE SHOULDER, THE FUSIL ROTATED SLIGHTLY IN TOWARD THE HEAD AND THE LEFT HAND HOLDING THE FUSIL BY THE COMB AT A DISTANCE OF ABOUT FOUR FINGERS' WIDTHS FROM THE END OF THE STOCK.






TO MOVE FROM ARMAS AL HOMBRO TO DESCANSEN SOBRE LAS ARMAS:

WHEN HEARING THIS COMMAND, WITH THE LEFT HAND, ROTATE THE FUSIL LYING ON THE SHOULDER SO THE LOCKPLATE FACE UP AND THE HAMMER IS TOWARD THE CHIN. BRING THE RIGHT HAND ACROSS AND GRIP THE FUSIL FIRMLY BY THE WRIST OF THE STOCK. RAISE THE ELBOWS UP AND OUT AT THE LEVEL OF THE SHOULDERS.

- 1. WHEN HEARING THIS COMMAND, WITH A FIRM GRIP ON TO FUSIL, LIFT IT OFF THE SHOULDER AND HOLD IT DIRECTLY IN FRONT OF THE FACE IN A VERTICAL POSITION, SOME FOUR INCHES AWAY SO THAT THE EYES ARE ABOUT LEVEL WITH THE LOCKPLATE RETAINING SCREW, BUT WITH THE LOCK STILL FACING AWAY FROM THE FACE, THE ELBOWS STILL AT THE HEIGHT OF THE SHOULDERS.
- 2. TAKING THE WEIGHT OF THE FUSIL



- 1. WITH THE RIGHT HAND GRIPPING THE FUSIL NEAR THE MUZZLE, EXTEND THE RIGHT ARM UPWARDS, CARRYING THE FUSIL VERTICALLY BESIDES THE BODY. AT THE SAME TIME, CARRY THE LEFT ARM ACROSS THE BODY AND WITH THE LEFT HAND SEIZE THE FUSIL JUST ABOVE THE LOCK.
- 2. HOLDING THE FUSIL STEADY IN THE LEFT HAND, DROP THE RIGHT HAND AND GRASP THE FUSIL BELOW THE LOCK ON THE SMALL OF THE BUTT, ENSURE THAT THE FUSIL REMAINS IN A VERTICAL POSITION.

MILITARY RANK AND FILE

WHO WAS THE SPANISH SOLDIER IN 1740?


HE EARNED 11 PESOS A MONTH OR 132 A YEAR. ARTILLERYMEN AND CAVALRYMEN EARNED A LITTLE MORE. THERE WERE DEDUCTIONS FOR MEDICAL CARE, UNIFORMS, SUPPORT OF THE CHURCH AND FOOD TOTALING 119 PESOS A YEAR LEAVING HIM WITH 13 PESOS A YEAR OR ABOUT 1 PESO A MONTH. ST. AUGUSTINE DEPENDED ON THE SITUADO SYSTEM WHICH WAS SUBSIDLY FROM THE SPANISH GOVERNMENT. HE LIVED IN HOUSE IN TOWN. HE WOULD HAVE HAD A GARDEN AND ON HIS OFF TIME WOULD HAVE FISHED OR DONE SOME OTHER WORK TO SUBSIDIZE HIS INCOME. THOUGH IN MOST OF THE SPANISH KINGDOM, SOLDIERS WERE THE DREGS OF THE EARTH, ST. AUGUSTINE WAS A MILITARY TOWN, SO HE WOULD HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED LOWER TO MIDDLE CLASS. HIS KING WAS HIS MOST CATHOLIC MAJESTY FELIPE V, BY THE GRACE OF GOD KING OF THE SPAINS AND THE INDIES. THE KINGS COUSIN WAS LOUIS XV, KING OF FRANCE. THERE WAS CLOSE COOPERATION BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES. HIS POPE WAS BENEDICTIUS XIV, HIS GOVERNOR WAS MANUEL DE MONTIANO. THE COMMANDER OF 2ND INFANTRY COMPANY WAS CAPITAN DIEGO PABLOS ESCOBAR AND HIS EXECUTIVE OFFICER WAS ALFEREZ DOMINGO RODRIGUEZ.



THE DEFENDERS OF THE CASTILLO DE SAN MARCOS

CONFLICT ALONG THE SOUTH ATLANTIC SEABOARD

FEW AMERICANS TODAY KNOW THAT FOR OVER 235 YEARS, SPANISH TROOPS WERE STATIONED ALONG THE FLORIDA-GEORGIA COASTLANDS, FIGHTING PIRATES, ENGLISHMEN, AND INDIANS. THE RETURN VOYAGE OF SPANISH TREASURE GALLEONS RAN ALONG MILES OF SAVAGE FLORIDA COASTLINE FROM THE KEYS TO THE CAROLINAS; THESE SEALANES WERE CONSIDERED CRITICAL TO THE GLOBAL EMPIRE OF SPAIN. 18TH CENTURY BRITISH INTRUSION INTO THIS SENSITIVE REGION BROUGHT ABOUT YEARS OF WARFARE BETWEEN SPANISH AND BRITISH REGULARS, COLONISTS, AND RESPECTIVE INDIAN ALLIES.

THE MEN

UNLIKE THE SOLDIERS YOU MIGHT SEE ON DUTY IN A COLONIAL FRENCH OR BRITISH FORT, THE TROOPS DEFENDING SAN AGUSTIN WERE NOT UNITS ORGANIZED IN EUROPE. ROSTERS REVEAL THAT THE MAJORITY WERE HOMETOWN BOYS, THAT IS FROM THE FAMILIES OF SPANISH SETTLERS OF LA FLORIDA, STANDING IN THE RANKS WERE ALSO SOME REPLACEMENTS DRAFTED OUT OF CUBA, MEXICO, AND SOUTHERN SPAIN. THE FLORIDA GARRISON WAS AUTHORIZED A DOTACION OR PAYROLL ALLOTMENT OF JUST THREE INFANTRY MAPANIES, AN ARTILLERY DETACHMENT, AND A TROOP OF DRAGOONS, TOTALING AROUND 350-375 EFFECTIVES. DURING THE ANGLO-SPANISH WAR 1739-48, ADDITIONAL REINFORCEMENTS OF SPANISH REGULARS FROM SPAIN, HAVANA, AND VERACRUZ, PLUS ARMED INDIANS AND MILITIAMEN RAISED MILITARY MANPOWER LEVELS IN SAN AGUSTIN TO 995 MEN.

THE MILITARY MISSION: TASKS OF SPANISH COLONIAL TROOPS

DEFENDING THE PORT OF SAN AGUSTIN AND THE RAMPARTS OF THE CASTILLO DE SAN MARCOS WAS WITHOUT DOUBT THE OBJECTIVE WITH FIRST PRIORITY. FROM TIME TO TIME, A SOLDIER HERE WOULD ALSO FIND HIMSELF DETAILED TO MAN THE SCATTERED WOODEN WATCHTOWERS ALONG THE COAST, MISSIONS, AND OUT POSTS(FT. MATANZAS, FT. PICOLATA, FT. MOSE, ETC) OR TO BOARD THE SETTLEMENT'S SLOOP IN ORDER TO GUARD SUPPLIES, MAILS AND PAYROLLS IN VOYAGES TO AND FROM OTHER PORTS OF THE SPANISH MAIN. THESE FUSILEROS ALSO PROWLED THE MAZE OF TIDAL WATERWAYS BEHIND THE COASTAL BARRIER ISLANDS IN SHALLOW DRAFT ROWING PATROL BOATS, CALLED PIRAGUAS, WHICH MOUNTED SWIVEL GUNS AND SMALL CANNON IN THE BOWS, SEARCHING FOR SHIPWRECKS SURVIVORS AND PIRATES. MUCH OF A COLONIAL SPANISH SOLDIER'S LIFE WAS SUDDEN SMALL UNIT ACTION, FIREFIGHTS AND AMBUSHES, PUNCTUATING THE WEEKS OF BOREDOM, INSECTS, HEAT AND HUMIDITY SPENT IN ROTTING PALM THATCHED HUTS AND PINE LOG STOCKADES OR ON ENDLESS SUN-BAKED BOAT PATROLS.

UNIFORMS AND WEAPONS

LIKE SOLDIERS IN THE RANKS OF REGULAR SPANISH REGIMENTS IN EUROPE, FLORIDA FUSILEROS WERE COVERED FROM HEAD TO TOE IN UNIFORMS OF FELT, WOOL, AND LINEN. OVER AMPLE LINEN SHIRTS AND CRAVATS WERE WORN BREECHES, LONG SLEEVED WAISTCOATS AND GREAT COATS OF DARK BLUE WOOL TRIMMED WITH RED CUFFS. BLACK FELT TRICORN HATS WERE EDGED IN YELLOW BRAID, COMPLEMENTING THE DOZENS OF BRASS BUTTONS. LONG STOCKINGS OF RED WOOL COVERED THE SOLDIERS' SHANKS. SHARP TOED SHOES WITH HIGH TONGUES AND HEELS WERE MADE OF BLACK GOATSKIN, SOMETIMES BUCKLED, SOMETIMES NOT. THE BASIC SOLDIERS ARMAMENT WAS THE COMBINATION OF BAYONET AND FUSIL, A STURDY SMOOTHBORE GUN OF .69 CALIBER SIMILAR IN DESIGN TO THE 18TH CENTURY FRENCH CHARLEVILLE MUSKET,

IDEAL FOR ROUGH CONDITIONS IN FRONTIER AREAS AND THE MASSED FIREPOWER OF THE LINEAR TACTICS POPULAR WITH MILITARY OFFICERS IN THIS PERIOD. BUT UNLIKE THE MORE FAMILIAR FRENCH MUSKET, THE SPANISH FUSIL'S BARREL BANDS WERE BRASS, NOT STEEL, AND THE HAMMERS OF SPANISH FLINTLOCKS HAD A UNIQUE, ARABIC SHAPE UNLIKE ANY OTHER EUROPEAN FIRELOCK WITH A PRACTICAL LARGE STEEL RING ON THE TOP-JAW SCREW INSTEAD OF A SLOTTED SCREWHEAD FOR EASIER FLINT ADJUSTMENTS. TRAINED TROOPS WERE EXPECTED TO BE PROFICIENT ENOUGH IN THEIR DRILL TO GET THREE OT FOUR SHOTS INTO THE AIR IN A MINUTE'S TIME WITH SUCH A WEAPON. BAYONET SHEATHS AND NINE-ROUND LEATHER BELLYBOXES WERE WORN ON A THICK WAISTBELT, ALONG WITH SHORT MILITARY SWORD. OFTEN IN FLORIDA AND OTHER SPANISH AMERICAN COLONIES, THE SWORDS WERE LEFT IN TOWN IN FAVOR OF THE EVER-POPULAR MACHETE AND WHITE GAITERS PROTECTED THEIR LEGS WHEN TROOPS WENT INTO THE BACK COUNTRY.

COMBAT HISTORY

THE MOST SERIOUS TEST OF THE DEFENDERS OF THE CASTILLO DE SAN MARCOS WAS THE BRITISH ATTACK OF MAY-JULY 1740 IN WHICH THE TOWN AND THE FORT WERE CANNONADED FOR 27 DAYS. DURING THE SIEGE, SPANISH TROOPS ACHIEVED A CRUCIAL PSYCHOLOGICAL VICTORY IN A DAWN RAID ON A BRITISH OUTPOST(FT. MOSE) THREE MILES OUTSIDE THEIR DEFENSE LINES. UNDER CAPITAN ANTONIO SALGADO 300 FUSILIERS, BLACK MILITIAMAN, AND YAMASSEE INDIANS HACKED OVER A HUNDRED HIGHLAND SCOTS, BRITISH REGULARS. AND CAROLINA BACKWOODSMEN TO BITS IN HAND TO HAND COMBAT. WEEKS LATER THE BRITISH PULLED BACK DUE TO THE ARRIVAL OF SPANISH SUPPLY SHIPS, DETERIORATING MORALE, GROWING SICKNESS, THE APPROACH OF HURRICANES SEASON, AND THE UNEXPECTED TENACITY OF THE SPANISH COLONIAL DEFENSE FORCES. A YEAR LATER, THE TROOPS FROM FLORIDA GARRISON PARTICIPATED IN THE SPANISH COUNTERATTACK ON THE BRITISH GEORGIA; AN AMBUSH IN THE SWAMPS OF ST., SIMON'S ISLAND BLUNTED THE SPANISH ADVANCE, AND THE INVASION FORCES RETURNED TO FLORIDA. SKIRMISHES AND RAIDS CONTINUED IN THE FLORIDAGEORGIA BORDERLANDS FOR ANOTHER 6 YEARS UNTIL THE PEACE OF AUX-CHAPPELLE (1748)

ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY

CASTILLO DE SAN MARCOS WAS DEFENDED FROM THE DAYS OF ITS CONSTRUCTION UNTIL 1763 BY MEN OF THE THREE INDEPENDENT INFANTRY COMPANIES OF SAN AGUSTIN DE LA FLORIDA. THESE SOLDIERS WERE CONSIDERED INDEPENDENT PRESIDIAL TROOPS, THAT IS, REGULARS BUT NOT PART OF ANY REGIMENT UNTIL A REORGANIZATION OF THE SPANISH ARMY GROUPED THEM AS A BATTALION OF THE REGIMENT OF HAVANA IN 1753. IN 1761, THEY WERE AGAIN GRANTED AUTONOMY FROM THE FORMER REGIMENT. THESE FUSILEROS AND THEIR FAMILIES WERE WITHDRAWN FROM SAN AGUSTIN WHEN SPAIN DELIVERED FLORIDA TO GREAT BRITAIN ACCORDING TO THE TERMS OF THE 1763 TREATY OF PARIS, AS A RANSOM FOR THE VITAL PORTS OF HAVANA AND MANILA. RECENTLY CAPTURED BY THE BRITISH.

1702 SOLDIER

IN 1702 SPAIN AND FRANCE WERE AT WAR WITH ENGLAND. IN NOVEMBER, 600 ENGLISHMEN FROM THE CAROLINAS AND 600 YAMASSEE INDIANS ATTACKED ST. AUGUSTINE AND CAPTURED THE TOWN WITHOUT RESISTANCE. 1500 SPANIARDS, BLACKS, AND INDIANS FOUND REFUGE WITHIN THE WALLS OF THE CASTILLO. THE 4 ENGLISH CANNONS HAD NO EFFECT ON THE FORT, THEY HADN'T BROUGHT MORTARS, SO THEY COULD NOT DAMAGE THE INTERIOR OF THE FORT. THE SIEGE LASTED 6 WEEKS WHEN 4 RELIEF SHIPS FROM CUBA ARRIVED. BEFORE THE ENGLISH LEFT THEY BURNED THE TOWN TO THE GROUND. THE UNIFORM IN 1702 WASN'T MUCH DIFFERENT THAN IN 1740. THE SLEEVES OF THE GREATCOAT WERE MUCH SHORTER AND THE HAT WAS WHITE (EVENTUALLY GRAY FROM BLACKPOWDER) AND THE BRIM WAS DOWN. THE WEAPONS AND ACCOUTERMENTS CONSISTED MAINLY OF MATCHLOCK MUSKETS WITH PLUG BAYONETS, RAPIERS AND POWDER FLASKS. THERE WERE SOME FLINTLOCKS IN THE INVENTORY OF THE CASTILLO.

1763 LOUISIANA REGIMENTS

AS A RESULT OF THE FRENCH AND INDIAN WAR IN 1763 THE SPANISH GAVE FLORIDA TO THE ENGLISH, BUT WAS GIVEN LOUISIANA BY THE FRENCH. DURING THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, SPAIN WAS ALLIED WITH THE UNITED STATES. GENERAL BERNARDO GALVEZ, COMMANDER OF THE SPANISH TROOPS WON SEVERAL BATTLES OVER THE BRITISH AND HESSIAN TROOPS AT PENSECOLA AND MOBILE. THE UNIFORM OF THE SPANISH LOUISIANA REGIMENTS CONSISTED OF A WHITE COTTON COAT WITH BLUE CUFFS AND COLLAR(NO LAPELS), BLUE COTTON BREECHES AND WAISTCOAT. HE WORE WHITE GAITERS OVER WHITE STOCKINGS AND BLACK SHOES. HIS HAT WAS BLACK WITH WHITE TRIM AND RED COCKADE, HIS NECKSTOCK WAS BLACK. HIS WEAPONS AND ACCOUTERMENTS CONSISTED OF 1752 FUSIL, BAYONET ON A SHOULDER HARNESS, AS WELL AS A SHOULDER SLUNG CARTRIDGE BOX.
